 18 If I would count them, they are more than the sand. I awake, and I am still with you.
 19 Oh that you would slay the wicked, O God! O men of blood, depart from me!
 20 They speak against you with malicious intent; your enemies take your name in vain.
 21 Do I not hate those who hate you, O Lord? And do I not loathe those who rise up against you?
 22 I hate them with complete hatred; I count them my enemies.
 23 Search me, O God, and know my heart! Try me and know my thoughts!

tries. Many people are so scared and understandably unconfident and don't dare to join group meetings because they belong to so-called "vulnerable" groups. The security measures with social distancing have been important and also have been successful, I would say. But we must take care of a "re-start" of a social togetherness as soon as possible as well! A philosopher said recently with view on the social distancing: "A society without touching is a dead society." - It may be especially our duty as Christians to strengthen efforts to re-start social societies, because we know that on the one hand this world was always and will be always threatened by destruction and death - but on the other hand we are in God's hands and God is greater. King David sings about it in Psalm 139, a masterpiece of human self-evaluation. Wherever we may be, scared and threatened or happy and free from sorrows, alone or accompanied, in lockdown or on holiday, God is with us. He knows us, even better than we know ourselves. He knows our path of life and accompanies and leads us. God is even stronger than death and will lead us into life, as it is said in one of the last verses of the Bible (Revelations 21, 4): "He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." - Summertime, time to take a breath, to stop, and at least to try to get new strength for the next stretch of way which lays before us. There is no better way than to turn to God in meditation and prayer. Many years ago I visited the Saint Romuald Cathedral in Mechelen. At the entrance there was a sign in different languages which asked for being quiet and which encouraged prayer. The a bit bumpy, amusing German translation of the Flemish said: "It would also be appropriate to pray a bit." - Surely, the intention of the sign was a bit different, but this call is truly right. Right now in the summer time and especially with Covid19 with its difficulties, changes, re-starts, and new starts is the right time to meditate on my relationship to God, to confide in Him, and to take refuge in His arms. - I wish you a peaceful and blessed summertime with the rest you need, many nice impressions, and good new starts under God's safe conduct. Review and next plans

We have met again in June in Woluwe and Vossem and celebrated nice “services of the Word” (without Holy Communion). We are glad to see each other again in person and to sing and pray together and with Raymond at the organ. Additionally we broadcasted the services via the proven “Zoom” video chat and so a few more people could follow the service who needed to keep more distance or were far away. The church board decided to keep the possibility of the Zoom broadcast for a while to give more people the chance to join our services. We will evaluate this in autumn if it is worth to keep (and pay for it). We also hope to re-start with Holy Communion after the summer break. The next service is planned on 16 August as a “summer devotion”, probably again in the Sint-Paulus Church in Vossem. Our first “full” service as usual is planned for 30 August at 15:00 in the church in Woluwe. Covid19 circumstances permitting, we could also envisage to meet for our traditional “End-of-Summer-Picnic” later in September. – Since April we have had almost every week an Evening Prayer on Wednesday. After a good start with several people participation has decreased lately. We will see if the new academic year and autumn could also bring a new start for the Evening Prayers. The same applies to the Bible Study Group. If you are interested in a Bible Study Group in form of a “traditional” Bible study or rather a kind of “faith talk/formation”, please let the Pastor know! – Last but not least, we must say goodbye to the Ellingstad family now in summer. They have been with us several years as very faithful members and we thank God for their company and all the blessings brought to us through them!
