Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Change is in the air. Spring is almost over, temperatures are already like in the summer. The fresh light green is turning into strong, dark green or the yellow of the grain on the fields. After weeks of confinement we are waiting for change and normalisation. Many things are already possible again, more or less. And so we are looking forward to a “re-start” of our services now in June. – Strange months lay behind us. The world had to suddenly cope with this virus. Everything changed over night. And more than anything else, humanity had to learn that it was an error to think we have everything in our hands. Even such a small thing like a virus can do so much damage to our existence. And we talk a lot about the damages to our economy but we talk just rarely about the damage to our social relationships with “social distancing”, forbidden visits in hospitals and nursing homes, isolated children, and a society and community where touching, hugging, and being close to each other is banned. Some sociologists already warn about a division of the society. – Last Sunday, we celebrated Pentecost, the feast of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. This also means a change, a change of our total existence. More than any virus on this earth could ever do. With the Holy Spirit in our hearts we are able to believe in Jesus Christ. With the Holy Spirit the “social distancing” to God, caused by our sin, is healed and overcome. With the Holy Spirit our hearts were changed from stone to flesh (The Bible, Ezekiel, 36, 26-27a: God says: “And I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within you. And I will remove the heart from stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my spirit within you...”), from death to life (the Bible, John 3), from being a lost thing to a good creature in the image of God (the Bible, Genesis 1, verses 26-27 and chapter 2, 7: “Then the Lord God formed the man of dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life.”). And with the Holy Spirit, we are embedded in a community no virus can destroy. – Change is in the air, since Pentecost for the world, since our Baptism for us. Maybe the last months have also brought a change to your life which is not bad at all. More time with the family, for example more meals together. Or time to think about your life and a possible new start or “just” more time for your hobby and recreation. And also some good signs are visible in politics and society: the democracies seem to be strong in times of crisis against anti-democratic populists; deficits in different sectors, for example in the health and care systems, were revealed and at least the will is there to change something. Many people showed more solidarity towards each other. Yes, foremost the Holy Spirit works in the Church through Word and Sacrament to bring us the forgiveness of sins and presence of God. Jesus had promised that and thereon we shall trust. Nothing is as important than this. But we don't know how and where the Holy Spirit works apart from that to heal and preserve the world. Let us hoist our sails to use the fresh

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From the Church Board – Antependiums for our congregation

Again, due to the confinement with no greater expenses (no church rent, no organ fee, no travel costs) and thanks to your ongoing offerings to the church account, we stabilised our financial situation. Many thanks to all of you who care for our congregation with money and prayers! Please consider also in the future to offer for ALCB, maybe also still via a regular bank transfer. This guarantees your offer also if you miss a service. – The Church Board also decided to take over old antependiums from a small congregation of our German partner church SELK against a small donation. An antependium is the textile in front (Latin: “ante”) of the altar, the pulpit, and the ambo (lectern) in the particular liturgical colour (white, purple, green, red). The congregation of Nestau in the Luneburg Heath (by the way the home congregation of Dorina, who was with us last autumn during her internship) became so small that they decided to close down and sell their church building. They offered all their items to the church public that they may bring blessing somewhere else. We are happy we were chosen to receive them to decorate the church more solemnly. Now, we are waiting for the post to deliver them...

Focus on liturgy: Church Year Circle – Trinity Time

With Pentecost Sunday we finally left the Easter circle and the first half of the Church Year. After Holy Trinity Sunday we will enter the time when the Sundays are just counted after Trinity. Some say it is the “fast-less” time, but of course every Sunday is a small Easter feast and the Sunday services in this time are not less worthy. Fact is that there are just few Sundays or feasts which have a topic of the “history of salvation” like Jesus’s birth or death and so they seem to be a bit less festive and a bit more “common”. Most of the Sundays in summer and autumn have ethical topics (“How should I live correctly?”) or deal with particular topics of the Church (Holy Communion, Baptism, the relationship between Christians and Jews, and others). Therefore, this time is also called “the semester of the Church” in contrast to “the semester of Christ” with Christmas, Easter and so on. Also now exciting passages lay before us and will ask us about us, our relationships, our lives and so on. Come and join us also in this time of the year!
